

CHIP IN TENNESSEE

CHIP is a state-federal health insurance program for children and pregnant women. Tennessee administers a combination CHIP program that includes CoverKids, a separate CHIP program, and TennCare Standard, a Medicaid expansion program. 98.5% of the cost is funded by the federal government and 1.5% is covered by Tennessee.¹

Congress has to reauthorize the funding for CHIP by September 30, 2017. At its current rate, Tennessee will exhaust funding by May 2018.²

Eligibility

Tennessee covers children in its regular Medicaid program, called TennCare, with incomes up to 195% of the federal poverty level (FPL) for infants, 142% for children ages 1 – 5, and 133% FPL for children 6 – 18.

Children who lose eligibility in TennCare qualify for coverage under a Medicaid expansion program, called TennCare Standard, if they are uninsured, have no access to insurance, and have family incomes below 211% FPL.

Tennessee also operates a separate CHIP program, called Cover Kids, which covers uninsured children of all ages who do not qualify for TennCare or TennCare Standard and have incomes below 250% FPL.³

Because of the overlap with Marketplace coverage and employer-sponsored coverage on the higher end of income eligibility, the vast majority of CoverKids recipients are under 200% FPL.

Benefits

States are able to design their own programs, determine which benefits are covered and set the level of cost sharing for recipients, which cannot be more than 5% of their income.⁵

CoverKids offers comprehensive coverage that must meet the approval of the Secretary of Health and Human Services. Tennessee's CoverKids program has the same standards as insurance offered to state employees. TennCare Standard's comprehensive coverage follows the same federal standards as TennCare.
